### **Course Description**

Prerequisite: None.

#### Credit Hours: 3

This course provides students with a background in applied statistical reasoning. Fundamental topics are covered including graphical and numerical description of data, understanding randomness, central tendency, correlation versus causation, line of best fit, estimation of proportions, and statistical testing.

Statistical thinking, relevant ideas, themes, and concepts are emphasized over mathematical calculation. In this class students learn many of the elementary principles that underlie collecting data, organizing it, summarizing it, and drawing conclusions from it.

### **Required Materials**

**Textbook:** There is no required textbook for this class. But *Statistical Reasoning for Everyday Life*, Pearson, Fifth Edition, 2018, by Bennet Briggs Triola is a good source.

Course Website: Canvas is accessible through canvas.fsu.edu. Please check Canvas regularly for class notes, announcements, grades and other course materials.

**Study Material:** Lecture notes will be provided on-line. Any additional (or changes to) lecture notes/slides will be added on the Canvas website so it is important that you check daily for updates via announcements. You will be filling in the notes during lectures, so you can choose to do this manually by printing the notes or on your laptop.

**Calculator:** TI-84 or equivalent. You may not use your phone as a calculator on exams. You need to bring this calculator to each class meeting.

### **Course Objectives**

This course has been approved to meet FSUs Liberal Studies Quantitative and Logical Thinking requirements and is designed to help you become a critical analyst of quantitative and logical claims. In order to fulfill the State of Floridas College mathematics and computation requirement the student must earn a C- or better in the course.

By the end of the course, students will demonstrate the ability to:

- 1. Select and apply appropriate methods (i.e., mathematical, statistical, logical, and/or computational models or principles) to solve real-world problems.
- 2. Use a variety of forms to represent problems and their solutions.

The above two competencies will be assessed in the Liberal Studies Quantitative Assessment for STA 1013, which includes a written summary of results.

- 3. Apply sound concepts of sample selection and experimental design in producing data.
- 4. Use statistical thinking in the context of work processes, academic endeavors, and everyday life.
- 5. Describe how inferential statistical methods are used to make valid judgments based on the data.
- 6. Evaluate the validity of statistical results with skepticism based on sensible considerations.

## **Tentative Pacing Schedule**

### Assessment and Grading

We will allow absolutely no make-ups, no extra credit assignments, and in general, no opportunities for grade improvement, after the Last Day of Class, so please do your best during the term. Assessments that are not taken will receive a zero grade. Your overall course grade will consist of the following:

- In-class Quizzes (50%): There will be 4 in-class quizzes during the semester. At each quiz you may use ONE self-planned self-handwritten two-sided 8.5x11 sheet of notes and your calculator.
- Attendance (10%): Attending class is important. Ill randomly check the attendance 10 times (random date & random time). 10 presence gives you the full credit for attendance. A proper absence excuse with corresponding documentation will give exemption.
- Liberal Studies Quantitative Assessment (10%): Note that, STA 1013 have been certified as one of FSUs Liberal Studies Quantitative and Logical Thinking courses. As a requirement, we must administer the appropriate Liberal Studies Quantitative Assessment (LSQA) during the semester. This will be a common assessment (not final exam). It will be part of the Quiz 3 and the total time length will be about 50 mins.
- Final Exam (30%): There will be a (cumulative) final exam given at our usual classroom. At the final exam you may use TWO self-planned self-handwritten two-sided 8.5x11 sheet of notes and your calculator. Make sure you arrive 5 minutes earlier as there will be random seating assignments.
- Extra credits (5%): Extra credits could be earned by answering extra credits problems either in quizzes or exams.

## Grading Scale

Final Letter grade will be calculated based on the following chart. All grades will be recorded as percentages, and these percentages (not points) will be used in your overall course grade calculation. I will round your overall course grade UP to the next higher whole number before matching it to a letter grade.
