## **Course Description**

### **Credit Hours** 3

Prerequisites None, but we recommend two years of high school algebra.

**Special Note** High school students who earn a "3" or better on the AP Statistics exam will be given credit for STA 2023.

The course covers statistical applications in business, involving graphical and numerical descriptions of data, data collection, correlation and simple linear regression, elementary probability, random variables, Binomial and Normal distributions, sampling distributions, and confidence intervals and hypothesis tests for a single sample.

The purpose of this course is to prepare students for further study and job preparation in the field of Business. It will emphasize understanding of data and interpretation of statistical analyses. It will require students to think of data, and report the results of their analyses, in context.

### Materials

- A personal computer, reliable internet connection, and Chrome or Firefox browser.
- A TI-84 Plus or equivalent calculator. We will teach you how to use a TI-84 series calculator, but we cannot promise to be able to help with any other type of calculator.
- A textbook is not required for this class. The instructor will provide all required course notes and exercises.

## **Learning Objectives**

This course has been approved to meet FSU's Liberal Studies Quantitative and Logical Thinking requirements and is designed to help you become a critical analyst of quantitative and logical claims. In order to fulfill the State of Florida's College mathematics and computation requirement the student must earn a "C-" or better in the course. By the end of the course, students will demonstrate the ability to:

- (1) Select and apply appropriate methods (i.e., mathematical, statistical, logical, and/or computational models or principles) to solve real-world problems.
- (2) Use a variety of forms to represent problems and their solutions.

The above two competencies will be assessed in the Liberal Studies Quantitative Assessment (LSQA) for STA 2122, which includes a written summary of results.

- (4) Use descriptive statistics and graphical methods to summarize data accurately.
- (5) Use inferential statistics to make valid judgments based on the data available.
- (6) Describe the goals of various statistical methodologies conceptually.
- (7) Apply statistical techniques in the context of business processes, everyday life, and further studies in their discipline.
- (8) Develop a healthy skepticism toward statistical studies and their results based on a sensible consideration of the techniques employed.

## **Assessments and Grading**

- Attendance (10%)
- Liberal Studies Quantitative Assessment (LSQA) (10%): There will be one LSQA, a universitymandated assessment covering one topic.
- Quizzes (50%): There will be five quizzes, each of which will cover approximately two weeks' worth of material, given through Canvas. Students must turn in a scanned copy or photo of their answers by clicking "Submit" on the Assignments tab. Each quiz score will be weighted equally.
- Final Exam (30%): There will be one cumulative final exam, which is scheduled for Dec 6 (Mon) at 3:00 5:00 PM (location TBA). Further instructions will be given as Final Exam Week approaches.
- Bonus Questions (up to 5%): You will be able to get extra credit from at least one bonus questions given in each quiz.

Students are NOT allowed to collaborate on the LSQA, quizzes including bonus questions, and final exam.
